ELYRIA — What a difference a month makes. After scoring 35 first-quarter points, Elyria Catholic breezed past Lakewood, 103-73, in West Shore Conference play on the Rangers' court Jan. 13.

It was a different story in the rematch Friday night in EC's Coliseum.

With senior guard Nick Porter scoring a career-high 33 points, the Rangers pulled away for a 77-63 victory in a WSC game that was closer than the score might suggest.

At 4:32 Kuchta nailed the first of his three 3-pointers, cutting the deficit to 59-55. He Elyria Catholic trailed for chunks of time nailed his second three with 3:50 to go and hroughout, including by 10 points in the sec- when he buried the third at 2:56, the Lakewood lead had been cut to 63-61.

But even with the Panthers' refusal to fold, coach Phil Kuchta said EC never really got it together as a team.
