

# Pirates look to rebound to top of conference

After finishing the 2012-2013 season as co-champs of the West Shore Conference, the Rocky River High School varsity boys basketball team took a little slide and finished last year with an overall record of 8-16.

Fourth-year head coach Michael Murray has a very experienced team coming back this year, and hopes are to get back to the top in this final season of the conference.

Key returners for the Pirates include point guard Patrick Connors, guard Eric Jones, guard/forward Jack Corrigan, forward/center Jimmy Kinsley, forward/center Nathan Seffernick and guard/small forward Sutton Klodnick.

"Eric Jones was first team All-WSC last year and honorable mention All-District," Murray explained. "He was also selected team MVP. Eric is one of the most talented players in the area and will be a leader on our team.

"Patrick Connors was injured during the second half of the season but still was selected honorable mention All-WSC," he continued. "Patrick is a very talented and athletic guard, and the two of them should make us difficult to guard.

"Jack Corrigan had some big games for us last year. During the second half of the year he was consistently in double figures each game. I look for him to really take off this season.

"Both Nate and Jimmy have played a ton of varsity basketball. Both of them work well together and both can hit the outside jumper. Jimmy will see a lot of time at the 4 this year as well, and he has a big body to help create mismatches."

Newcomers to varsity this year include Florida transfer Zach Waite, forward Evan Nugent, guard Gary Mathews; guard Justin Monte and small forward Corey Zucker.

"This year we have more players returning than last year," Murray said.
"We gained valuable experience and became very competitive as the season went on.

"We again play a very difficult schedule with some really tough non-league games as well. We are going to play a little different style this year. I believe we have more overall size and athleticism. Our commitment to our defensive schemes and tempo will be very important."







# River's big third quarter leads to win over Fairview

Throughout most of the first half, Fairview was playing on even terms with longtime rival Rocky River. But as halftime approached, a few warning signs started popping up for the visiting Warriors

A missed layup here. A hastily-shot 3-pointer there.

And as the third quarter began, the Pirates began to take advantage of Fairview's shooting woes. Their transition game fed off the numerous missed shots as they outscored the visitors, 22-6, in the guarter and ran away with a 62-36 win Friday night in the season opener for both teams.

"In the first half, I loved what I saw out of my team," said Fairview head coach Pete Maienknecht, whose team played dead even with River for the first 10-plus minutes of the game

"We came out and battled. We were poised early in the game, which was great for it being the first game and an arch-rival type of game. I think it's really important that you come out and take care of the basketball in that situation

"You've got to be very poised and sure with the ball, and I thought early on we did a pretty good job," he said.

The Warriors did just that. They committed just six turnovers in the half, while Rocky River committed 10 miscues and looked stagnant offensively at times. But with every missed shot, the Pirates were able to get their transition game up and running.

Fairview had tied the game at 12-12 on a drive down the lane from junior guard Jared Butler. The two teams traded missed free throws before River senior Jimmy Kinsley scored inside off an offensive rebound. He was fouled on the play, and hit the resulting free throw for a 15-12 Pirate lead.



Then, I thought we got a little discouraged and started to get impatient on offense. Guys started playing hero basketball nstead of team ball. We took some ill-advised shots that led to quick transition for Rocky River.

"And our defensive transition really broke down in the second half. When Rocky River was able to get running like that, they got on a roll and got going. Things kind of snowballed

Maienknecht also felt his team had problems solving River's zone defense in the second half.

"They went to that zone, and it disrupted our rhythm, We didn't do a good job staving poised, working the gaps and trying to distort that zone. Instead of being patient, we kind of forced things" he said.

"They pay five guards predominantly out there, and all five of those guys can shoot it," Murray said. "We thought by going zone and using a little bit of length, we could push them out a little bit further.

"I think they shot a little deeper than they wanted, and that led to some transition for us there at the start of the third quarter. We were able to get some transition baskets and build our lead," he said.

For the game, Williams and junior Derek Schwarber led the way with nine points each. Butler was close behind with eight, while senior Liam McCafferty chipped in with six. But that wasn't nearly enough to offset the Warriors' overall shooting slump and a 50-21 deficit on the boards.

"According to our shot chart, we were seven for 21 on layups and four of 22 from the 3-point line," Maienknecht said. "I liked what we were doing on offense early in the game. We were getting what we wanted, but we missed a lot of shots that you've got to make."

River's balanced effort was led by junior Evan Nugent's 11 points off the bench, Corrigan. Jones and Kinsely each had nine points, while Connors and Klodnick each added seven.

"I credit our kids with the depth we showed tonight," Murray said. "We played a lot of kids and our guys that came off the bench played well.

"I do think we have some guys who can fill it up. But when we shared the basketball like we did in the second half and got out in transition, it was nice," Murray said. "Different guys were able to get to the rim and score.

"And then we rebounded the basketball very well. I thought our guys did a much better job rebounding the basketball from the second quarte

Rocky River, which never trailed in the game, took off from there, A steal for two from senior Sutton Klodnick led to a Fairview timeout with 4:56 left in the half. The Pirates closed out the quarter with a modest 8-4 run to make it 25-16 at the half.

"It was the first game of the year, and we knew there was going to be a little struggle there in the first quarter," said River head coach Michael Murray, "But it extended through the first half.

"I credit Fairview for really attacking us, and that put us on our heels a bit defensively," he said. "I thought they did a nice job spreading us out and getting into the gaps. Then we go into halftime with 10 tumovers and only two assists."

"We're changing our offense around, and we're trying to play with more pace. But for awhile there, it was too

much dribbling and not enough sharing the basketball. I think in the second half, we had eight assists and only five turnovers, so we played much better," he said.

The Pirates came out with an 8-0 run to start the third quarter. Kinsley hit a pair of free throws, then senior Pat Connors got a steal for two. A Connors fast break hoop off an assist from junior Eric Jones kept that quicker pace going, and a rebound for two from junior Jack Corrigan had the Pirates up 33-16.

A baseline drive for two by senior Ryan Williams got Fairview on the board and sparked a 6-2 Warrior run. But River closed out the quarter with a 12-0 stretch that started with a Klodnick trey and ended with a pair of free throws from senior Gary Matthews.

"In the second half, we continued to miss some shots that we needed to go down," Maienknecht said. "That would have changed the rhythm and momentum of the game, but we couldn't get that to happen.





# Herman wins Broyles award

Ohio State offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach Tom Herman was named the winner of the Broyles Award on Tuesday, after the Buckeyes made the College Football Playoff despite losing two starting quarterbacks to season-ending injuries. The Buckeyes went 12-1 and beat Wisconsin 59-0 in the Big Ten championship game despite using their third starter of the year. "It's the hand we were dealt, and we played it," Herman said. Other finalists included offensive coordinators Lane Kiffin at Alabama, Scott Frost for Oregon and Doug Meacham at TCU and Missouri defensive coordinator Dave Steckel.

# **Emmert frets about UAB cuts**

NCAA President Mark Emmert said Tuesday that it was troubling to see the University of Alabama-Birmingham drop its football program, but he believes Olympic sports are more vulnerable to cuts as schools look at athletic budgets. Emmert told the Associated Press that he worries that while autonomy for the Big Five conferences will lead to more money being spent on athletes, it could decrease the overall number of opportunities in college sports for students. UAB dropped its football program last week, citing the rising costs of college athletics, including pressure to pay the full cost of attendance for athletes. That proposal was supported by Emmert and pushed by the wealthiest conferences.

# Conlan, Thomas join Hall

Shane Conlan, the former All-America linebacker who helped Penn State win their last national title, is part of a class of 14 former players and two coaches inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame on Tuesday. The group of honorees included: North Carolina cornerback Dre Bly; Southern California offensive tackle Tony Boselli; Purdue defensive tackle Dave Butz; Georgia Tech quarterback Joe Hamilton; Maine linebacker John Huard; Stanford halfback Darrin Nelson; Louisiana Tech offensive tackle Willie Roaf; South Carolina wide receiver Sterling Sharpe; McNeese State cornerback Leonard Smith; TCU running back LaDainian Tomlinson; Mississippi tight end Wesley Walls; and the late Derrick Thomas, who dominated at linebacker for Alabama. The coaches are Jerry Moore, who won I-AA titles at Appalachian State, and Mike Bellotti, the winningest coach in Oregon history.

# Starcovic's surge gives Eagles a lift

OLMSTED TWP. — Good coaches can fig-

ure out how to stop a great player.

So while, yes, North Olmsted has the luxury of a game-changing, 6-foot-6, inside-outside threat in Andy Lucien, the Eagles will need more to truly make some noise. And it appears they have it. On Friday against

Olmsted Falls, more came from a fourth-quarter surge from senior Matt Starcovic, whose ninepoint burst early in the quarter turned a close game into a rout in seemingly the blink of an eye. North Olmsted finished off the Bulldogs 74-65

to improve to 5-0 and 3-0 in the Southwestern Conference. Lucien led the way with 22 points and 13 rebounds, while Starcovic finished with 17, 16 in the second half.

"I wasn't feeling it the first half — (I got) a rest, and I started hitting them," said Starcovic, who credited his success last year — he hit 40 3-pointers — in helping him develop confidence on the court. "I've taken that into this year."

The Bulldogs (2-3, 1-2) hung around for 25 minutes of play, using their press to force a few turnovers and their 3-point shooting to trim the Eagles lead. In fact, after North Olmsted opened a 13-point edge — at 55-42 late in the third on a Josh Hufstetler three and a Lucien turnaround in the paint — the Bulldogs scored the next seven to get back within six at 55-49. Kevin Meehan had four of those seven, sandwiched around a Troy Hurrrell three.

But Starcovic, who'd struggled in the first half with turnovers and missing a few easy ones, then took over. He hit a contested 3-pointer after a nice save in the corner by teammate Ryan Coleman, then knocked another down in transition off a turnover.

He then made one of two free throws, and after Ryan Sosic stemmed the tide for Falls with two free throws, Starvovic — confidence clearly growing — scored on a nifty spin move in the lane.

Coleman and Lucien added subsequent buckets. Just like that, the Eagles had a 13-2 run and a 68-51 lead.

"We have guys that when they have those opportunities, they can create problems,"

North Olmsted coach Jason Frolo said. "Matt hit some big threes. Sometimes he doesn't have a conscience.

"Having multiple guys that can score like that is huge for us. We never thought we were going to be a one-man team. We knew those other guys are pretty darn good players in their own right, and they showed that tonight."

The Bulldogs thrive on creating havoc through their pressure, and while North Olmsted committed 14 turnovers — a chunk of which came in the final minutes with the game essentially out of reach — Frolo credited junior point guard Kyle Wapshott with steadying the team.

Wapshott, who missed all of last season after suffering a broken jaw in preseason practice, had 11 points and generally handled the Bulldogs' pressure well.

Falls coach Chris DeLisio, meanwhile, said he thought North Olmsted simply beat his team to the punch. North Olmsted outrebounded the Bulldogs 37-24 and, while some of that surely has to do with Lucien's size, DeLisio was not pleased. He also thought the Eagles simply beat his team to too many loose balls.

"Early on, at least the game was going our speed," DeLisio said. "But overall, you can't press and not play hard. We're not playing hard enough. Every loose ball went to them, and that's not luck.'

Hurrell led the Bulldogs with 19, including five threes. Sosic chipped in 15. Coleman (12 points) and Tommy Sullivan (11) joined Lucien, Starcovic and Wapshott in double figures.

# 'Horns gut out victory

ROCKY RIVER - Patriot Athletic Conference matchups usually provide an evening of exciting and entertaining basketball and Friday night was no exception as the Lutheran West Longhorns made just enough adjustments to circumstances to register a 53-43 win against a relentless Firelands Falcons team.

Things started out as the pushand-press Longhorns normally expect with a fast-paced offense and kinetic defense produced a 21-11 first-quarter lead in a game that looked like it might become an indoor track meet.

The Falcons (1-3, 0-3 PAC) were not going to be run out of the gym, however, and roared back with a strong quarter of their own, outscoring Lutheran West 19-12 to close to within 33-30 by halftime.

"I thought we played well," Firelands coach Brett Bartlett said. "We got down 27-11 and our guys didn't quit so we're real proud of our effort there fighting right back.'

Firelands came all the way back with 3:12 left in the game to tie it at 40.

The disparity in the scoring in the first half resulted, in part, from both teams hitting cold stretches in a game in which the video wasn't going to be used at a basketball shooting seminar anyway. But the first two quarters were in no way a clue as to what was to come.

Something happened at halftime and it wasn't good. The game got more physical than a UFC title bout and combined with a slower pace produced fouls galore in a tortured eight minutes in which the Longhorns (4-1, 2-1) ended the third period with as many fouls (seven) as points while "winning" the quarter 7-4.

"Sometimes it just comes down to who puts the ball in the basket," Longhorns coach Alan Ianuzzi said. "It was just a lot of patient, half-court offensive possessions. To take the positive side, I think that both teams just played good half-court defense.'

Both teams shot under 35 percent from the field. Lutheran West's 6-foot-4 senior Andrew O'Hara led all scorers with 19 points and added 12 rebounds despite early foul trouble.

O'Hara was still a force at the end, playing with four fouls as he and Clay Carper put away the Falcons by registering the Longhorns' final eight points on consecutive free throws.

"Andrew's smart, because obviously they wanted to get the ball to Colin (Myers, the Falcons' 6-4 sophomore) looking for that fifth foul," Januzzi said. "But Andrew played it smart and we put Dom (Januzzi) on Myers to help him out."

Three-point sniper James Wilbond hit 5-of-8 from behind the arc to lead Firelands with 16 points. Jack O'Keefe's nine points off the bench aided in keeping the Falcons buoyant after losing point guard Cole Sklarek to fouls early in the fourth.

"They come after you," Bartlett said. "If you don't play strong they get turnovers and layups on you. That happened early but through the course of the game I thought we got better at that. We just didn't make them pay and convert. Bottom line is we missed too many layups and we missed free throws. If we make our free throws and make our layups I think we come away with a win today."

# Tribute to pair who died David Chodounsky paid a fitting tribute to the

two junior members of the U.S. ski team who were killed in an avalanche in Austria. Competing in the opening leg of a World Cup slalom race in Croatia on Tuesday, the American skied one of the best runs of his life and ended up with the third-fastest time. When he crossed the finish line, he pointed at his helmet, which carried a piece of tape saying "Remember BA + RB." All U.S. ski team athletes at the race joined in the mourning of development team members Ronnie Berlack, 20, and Bryce Astle, 19, who died Monday near the Rettenbach glacier in the mountains over Soelden, the U.S. ski team's European training base since 2011. The Americans wore black armbands during the race, while the American flag in the finish area was flying at half-staff. A 30-second moment of silence was held before the race started.

Busch's ex-girlfriend, Patricia Driscoll, says Busch choked her and smashed her head into a wall three times inside his motorhome at Dover International Speedway in September. ... Organizers say that a Polish motorcyclist competing in the Dakar Rally has died of unknown causes. Dakar said in a special bulletin on its website Tuesday that Michal Hernik, 39, died during the third stage of the race between San Juan and Chilecito, Argentina.

# Entering drug treatment UFC light-heavyweight champion Jon Jones has

entered a drug treatment facility, according to a report Tuesday from Yahoo Sports. The report said Jones tested positive on Dec. 4 for benzoylecgonine, which is the main metabolite for cocaine. Jones is coming off perhaps his signature victory Saturday, a unanimous decision over Daniel Cormier at UFC 182 in Las Vegas. Jones outworked Cormier, a two-time U.S. Olympic wrestler and previously undefeated MMA fighter, to win the five-round fight decisively.

# Nadal ousted, Djokovic rolls

Defending champion Rafael Nadal was ushered to the exit, while top-seeded Novak Djokovic cruised through his first match of the season at the Qatar Open on Tuesday. The second-seeded Nadal, showing desire but displaying a rusty game, was upset by German qualifier Michael Berrer 1-6, 6-3, 6-4 in the first round. It was Nadal's first match since losing in the Basel quarterfinals to 17-year-old Borna Coric of Croatia in October. The Spaniard spent much of the autumn suffering from appendicitis and underwent an appendectomy on Nov. 3.

# Roy Tarpley dies at 50 Roy Tarpley, the former Dallas Mavericks star

center whose NBA career was cut short by drug abuse, has died. He was 50. A Tarrant County (Texas) medical examiner's report says Tarpley died Friday afternoon at Texas Health Arlington Memorial Hospital. No cause of death was given in the online report. The 7-foot Tarpley was the seventh pick in the 1986 NBA Draft out of Michigan. He played for the Mavs until October 1991, when he was kicked out of the NBA for using cocaine. He played in Greece until the NBA reinstated him in 1994. He signed a six-year, \$20 million contract with the Mavericks but was permanently banned from the NBA in December 1995 for using alcohol and violating the terms of a court-imposed personal aftercare program. Tarpley averaged 12.6 points and 10.0 rebounds in 280 career NBA games.



Arnold had 13 points and five rebounds, while Abdel-Alim had 11 points and five rebounds to pace a balanced scoring effort for the Rangers. Montgomery added nine, while Sullinger and Cory Draft finished with six each.

"We knew their record wasn't that good, but we also knew they weren't going to be an easy game," Abdel-Alim said. "We knew that, if they played their game, they could have a chance to beat us. We just had to make sure we played our best."

The Rangers forced Rocky River into 19 turnovers and outrebounded the Pirates 34-23. Neither team shot particularly well, but the rebounding edge led to many one-shot possessions and some second-chance points.

"That's huge for us," Morgan said.







After a slow start to their 2014-15 season, the Rocky River Pirates will have a tough time winning the final West Shore Conference championship.

But if Friday night's game with WSC contender Lakewood was any indication, they could have a big say in who does.

The Pirates jumped out to a big lead early and pulled off a 12-0 run in the third quarter to stun the Rangers, 71-60, on a night that threw the WSC race into a logjam. River's second conference win played a big part in sending the

conference race into a four-way tie.

Bay and Lakewood, who came into Friday night tied for first, both lost. Bay, which had won nine in a row, saw a double digit lead slip away in an 86-79 loss to Elyria Catholic. In the meantime, Avon was putting a 66-48 beatdown on Midview.

Those results put Avon, Bay, EC and Lakewood atop the WSC standings, each at 5-3, with six games remaining, Midview and North Ridgeville, a 39-36 loser against Vermilion, are tied for second at 4-4.

Rocky River is just 2-6 in the WSC, but Pirates head coach Michael Murray felt the best was yet to come for his squad.

"Early in the year, we played well and lost some close games," said Murray, whose team moved to 5-7 overall. Then we went through a time where we had some kids injured and other kids getting sick,

"That's no excuse, but in getting kids back to practice, we've been able to work on things. You can see during the games that their confidence is much higher, and they're playing with a lot better pace offensively. We're able to create off the dribble and share the basketball more.

"We're able to spread things out more, and today, we were able to get the ball inside. We got our bigs some touches, and that hasn't happened in the past," he said.

Murray's Pirates got a lot of touches early and often, Down 3-0, River got three straight 3-pointers from junior guard Jack Corrigan. He connected from both corners and the right wing, prompting Lakewood head coach Phil Argento to call a timeout just 2:07 into the game.

But the break did nothing to slow down the Pirates, who connected on eight of 13 from the floor in the quarter with five treys, four of them from Corrigan, River led 21-11 after one quarter and 36-27 at the half,

"Getting off to a good start is important to us," Murray said.
"We haven't done that early in the year, but the last couple
of games we have.



"That's really helped us. We got off to a good start defensively as well, and that helped springboard us," Murray continued. "They're very hard to guard. Not only do they shoot it well, they drive it well and pass well. What we tried to do was make them take tough shots, and I thought we did that.

"They buried some in the first half with a hand in their face, but for the most part we stayed in front of them and made them take tough shots," he said.

The Rangers scored first in the third quarter on a reverse layup from senior Joe Malone, At 36-29, the visitors were still within range, but what happened in the next five-plus minutes changed all that.

River went on a 12-0 run, starting with an offensive rebound for two from junior Evan Nugent. A pair of free throws from junior Eric Jones and another 3-pointer from Corrigan had the Rangers back on their collective heels.

Jones hit on another drive, then the march to the free throw line began. The Pirates made just three of their next six attempts, but by then the lead had grown to 19 points, 48-29, with 2:11 left in the quarter.

Things got worse for the Rangers when River reached the bonus with 1:15 left in the third. For the game, the Pirates made 19 of 26 free throws to Lakewood's seven of 12. The home team made nine of 12 attempts in the game's final 3:10 to help close out the game.

After a lengthy post-game discussion in the Rangers' locker room, Argento didn't mince any words concerning his team's performance.

"We just had a very serious conversation with our guys about where they want to go, what they want to do and how they want to do it," he said.

"We played tonight like we've practiced, and that's a bigger issue for us. It trumps what Rocky River was doing," Argento said. "The things that every coach is trying to do in practices is to get better and show improvement in different phases of the game, whether it's offensive execution or

defensive intensity, We haven't been getting better,

"At the beginning of the second round, you should be seeing guys who weren't doing things earlier in the year start to get it, We're not getting it, and that's a serious problem," he added,

Corrigan, thanks to a 16-point first half, wound up with a game-high 22 points.

"Jack has done an amazing job this year," Murray said.

"He's played in a couple of games where he's had maybe two reps of practice just from being sick," Murray recalled. "Then he had a high ankle sprain, but he's never complained. He missed a game, and he went through a stretch where he could barely practice.

"Now he's getting his reps in practice, and it's great to see that hard work pay off. The last couple of games, you've seen the Jack Corrigan that we knew we had," he added.

Jones was right behind Corrigan with 20 points. Pat Connors chipped in with eight points, while Jimmy Kinsley had seven rounds. River outrebounded the Rangers, 31-24.





ion, 56-49.







# Pace of game addressed

NEW YORK — Major League Baseball is slowly addressing the lagging pace of games.

MLB and the players' association announced an agreement Friday to enforce the rule requiring a hitter to keep at least one foot in the batter's box in many cases. MLB also will post stadium clocks timing pitching changes and between-inning breaks starting in spring training, and it no longer will require managers to always come onto the field when they request video reviews by umpires.

But the sides limited penalties to warnings and fines, and not automatic balls and strikes. The fines don't start until May 1 and are capped at \$500 per offense.

Many of the more radical ideas experimented with during the Arizona Fall League were not adopted, such as a 20-second clock between pitches, a limitation of pitcher's mound conferences involving catchers and managers, and no-pitch intentional walks.

Still, even the modest changes are too much for players, used to their routines and reluctant to alter them.

"If you rush a hamburger, it's not going to be completely too many mistakes. You're rently







"I'm really proud of our effort tonight because we could have packed it in a couple of times," Gundert said. "But we have to do a better job of taking care of the ball, it killed us early.



# Clippers can't stop Grauel in 2nd half

YORK TWP. — Ryan Grauel sat on a locker room bench at halftime and peered into the deepest part of his soul. He then asked himself a question: Is this how he wanted to end his high school basketball career?



### Rockets hold off Pirates to move on in DII tourney

During their two regular season meetings, the Rocky River Pirates gave the Bay Rockets all they could handle as the two teams split the series. In Friday night's rubber match, nobody expected anything different as the longtime rivals met for a Division II sectional championship.

So when Rocky River's Jack Corrigan drilled a 3-pointer with two minutes left in the game, most fans at The Launch Pad were on the edge of their seats.

Clinging to a 51-47 lead, the Rockets managed to answer. They hit nine of 10 free throws down the stretch and came away with a 62-54 win over the Pirates that sent them to next week's district semifinals at North Ridgeville.

Bay, now 16-7, will face either Vermilion or Padua Thursday at 7 p.m. A win there would put the Rockets in the district championship game on Sat., March 14 at 4 p.m. at North Ridgeville High School.

Keystone and Holy Name play Wednesday night in the other semifinal game.

"In tournament basketball, anybody can make a run," said Bay head coach Jared Shetzer, whose team led the entire way.
"And they made some good runs at us.

"We got off to a great start, but you knew it was coming," Shetzer said. "They're a great defensive team. Coach Murray does a fantastic job with those kids. We knew they would come back.

"I give our kids credit, because they came back and answered the bell."

That great start had Shetzer's Rockets up 7-0 and pitching a shutout until Evan Nugent scored inside for the Pirates with 3:30 left in the first quarter. Bay led by 10, 12-2, but Rocky River bounced back to trail by only four, 13-9, heading into the second quarter.



"We didn't do anything any differently than we've done all year, except for the fact that we played defense for probably the first time in the two years I've been here," said Shetzer, whose team forced 18 Pirate tumovers on the night.

"If that's the way we're going to be defensively the rest of the way, we're going to be pretty tough to beat," Shetzer said.

Bay committed its fair share of turnovers, giving the ball up five times in the fourth quarter while trying to protect the lead.

"That's a product of having kids who are told to play fast all of the time," Shetzer said.

"You want them to play fast, then you're saying 'hey, slow down a second' and go possession by possession. Sometimes kids just want to make plays. I'd rather have kids who want to make plays than kids who are terrified to have the bell."

"It's a double-edged sword," he added.

After Koz, 6-8 senior Rex Sunahara contributed 11 points and eight rebounds despite picking up his fourth foul in the third quarter,

From there, no other Rocket reached double figures. Brandon Morriss had six points and six rebounds, while Jonathon Brajdic, Alec White, Scott Durham and Heideloff each scored five points. Durham, playing big minutes in Sunahara's absence, also had five rebounds.

For Rocky River, Jones led the way with 16 points, while Corrigan finished with 11 Points and 10 rebounds. Pat Connors added nine points as the Pirates concluded their season at 10-13.

"We did compete, and we were able to make some runs," Murray said.

In the second, River made another run and pulled to withir a point, 16-15, on a steal for two by Sutton Klodnick. But the home team answered with a 10-1 run to close out the half. John Koz was a big part of that Rocket outburst, scoring six of his game-high 21 points in that stretch.

Bay held a 26-16 halftime lead, but the Pirates kept coming.

Rocky River pulled to within two points twice late in the third quarter, once on a 3-pointer from Eric Jones and the other on a driving jumper from Klodnick. But Koz came back with a pair of free throws and a 3-pointer in the quarter's final minute to give Bay a 40-33 lead heading into the fourth.



The Rockets led by as many as 12 points, 45-33, in that final quarter. River made one last run, with Corrigan's trey keeping the game in doubt. But moments later, Danny Heideloff hit both ends of a one-and-one to start Bay's game-clinching march to the free throw line.

For the game, the Rockets hit 26 of 31 free throw attempts. Rocky River, which shot just 38 percent from the floor on the night, made five of 13 attempts from the stripe.

"I had us for shooting 25 threes in the game, and they shot eight," said River head coach Michael Murray when asked about the free throw discrepancy.

"That's part of it. We were more perimeter-oriented than they were tonight," Murray continued. "They definitely benefited at the line. Maybe there were times where we could have gone to the line, but we didn't.

"We settled for a lot of jumpers, and that had a lot to do with it," he said.

Shetzer, on the other hand, felt his team's defense played a big part in the win.

"But there were times where we'd either settle for the long jumper, or didn't get back on defense to give them some easy baskets,. When we stayed in front, they struggled. But then we gave them some easy layups.

"I bet we gave up 10 points on them throwing the ball ahead and getting open layups," he said.

When it was all said and done, it was all about execution, according to Murray.

"I'm proud of our kids' effort," Murray said. "Our effort was there, but our execution wasn't.

"We played OK on defense, but there were a lot of missed opportunities where they were handing the ball off, or a high screen where we didn't hedge, times when we didn't block out and couldn't get the rebound.



"For us to have a defensive game like that and have a poor shooting night, it's a recipe for not winning a game," he said.

# Rockets defeat Rocky River for sectional crown

In their third meeting of the season the Bay High School boys' varsity squad kept visiting Rocky River from mounting a second-half comeback and won the rubber-match, 62-54, for the Division II sectional championship Friday night before a capacity crowd at The Launching Pad.

Bay came out strong offensively, scoring 13 points in each of the first two quarters, while holding Rocky River to nine and seven points, respectively.

"We got off to a great start, but you knew they'd come back," Shetzer explained. "You have to just give our kids credit that we answered the bell.

"We didn't do anything different than we've done all year, except that we played defense – probably in the first time in Bay basketball history since I've been here for two years."

Bay's 6-8 center Rex Sunahara sat for much of the third quarter with foul trouble, but junior Scott Durham came off the bench and sparked the defense, while chipping in five key second-half points.

"Scott Durham – if you talk to him – is a pretty carefree kid, and plays that

way sometimes, but tonight he was all business," Shetzer said. "Tonight, Scotty was the best version of himself, and he showed what he can do when he plays with some passion and intensity."

junior John Koz led the Rockets in scoring with 21 points, followed by Sunahara with 11, Brandon Moriss with six, and Jonathon Brajdic, Danny Heideloff, Alec White and Durham with five each. Bay senior Jack Kyle chipped in with four points.

After sitting most of the third, and the beginning of the fourth, Sunahara was sent to the foul line four times, and scored eight point to close out the game.

Bay (16-7) shot 31 foul shots in the game, compared to Rocky River's 13.

"We were fouling there at the end, so you could probably take out 10 of Bay's shots," Rocky River head coach Michael Murray said. "We were more perimeter-oriented than they were tonight, but they also benefited at the line.

"We just settled for a lot of jumpers, and that had a lot to do with the final score."

Rocky River (10-13) made seven 3point shots in the game, while Bay only had two.

Rocky River junior Eric Jones led the Pirates in scoring with 16 points, followed by Jack Corrigan with 11, Patrick Connors with nine, Sutton Klodnick with six, Evan Nugent with five, Zach Waite with four, Corey Zucker with two and Jimmy Kinsely with one.

The No. 2-seeded Rockets move on to play No. 4-seeded Vermilion tomorrow night at North Ridgeville High School in the district semifinals. The tip-off is set for 7 p.m.
