FAFSA for Seniors

In late 2020, the US Congress passed a law requiring significant changes to the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The Office of Federal Student Aid (FSA) is calling this revised edition the Better FAFSA. Some of these changes included a complete revamp of the technology platform that houses the FAFSA, a reduction of the number of questions that must be answered by the parents and students, and a more secure FSA ID sign-in system. Due to these and other changes, FSA has announced the Better FAFSA opened on December 31, 2023. Financial aid at colleges tends to be disbursed in the month or two immediately following that date. Both student and one parent must have an FSA ID in order to apply. Please see <https://studentaid.gov/h/apply-for-aid> for more information. Scholarships

Students should log in to their Clever account to account Naviance. Once on the Homepage, click the "Colleges" tab at the top of the screen. Then, under *Scholarships & Money*, navigate to Scholarship List. Here you can either look for College-Specific Scholarships, or click on "Local and Regional Scholarships" to access over 150 that we have shared with you. A great option is to sort by Deadline to see upcoming scholarships that may interest you.

Another option is to navigate to "Colleges", then under *Scholarships & Money*, there is the "National Scholarship Search", powered by Sallie Mae, containing over 3.5 million scholarships worth over \$18 billion.

High School Tech Internship program

Ohio Lt. Governor Jon Husted, who serves as director of the Governor's Office of Workforce Transformation, recently announced the High School Tech Internship program is open for Ohio students to enroll. The goal of the program is to provide Ohio businesses with the tech talent they need while providing students with valuable work experience at an early age.

To enroll in the program, individual students or school districts must contact the intermediary in their region to be connected to a business that is hosting an internship experience.

Interns will perform job duties similar to what is expected of an entry-level employee in technology roles that focus on software development, data, cloud and IT infrastructure, cybersecurity, broadband/5G, advanced mobility, and other tech-focused roles.

Ohio employers hosting interns will be reimbursed up to 100% of the wages paid to interns (up to \$5,000 per intern). Employers are also eligible to earn bonuses for each student who earns certain industry-recognized credentials. Interested businesses can contact the intermediary in their region to apply to host summer interns.

High School Tech Internship intermediaries allow the program to be administered seamlessly between schools and businesses. Intermediaries have several responsibilities to support the growth and administration of the internship program, including helping place students with participating employers.

Last year's High School Tech Internship program created the opportunity for 510 Ohio students to participate in internships with 141 employers across the state.

Naviance

Naviance Student is a comprehensive website that you can use to plan for college and a career while providing a service that we use in our office to track and analyze data about college and career plans, so it provides up-to-date information that is specific to our school. It allows you to:

Get involved in the planning and advising process – Build a resume, complete online surveys, and manage timelines and deadlines for making decisions about colleges and careers

Research colleges – Compare GPA, standardized test scores, and other statistics to actual historical data from our school for students who have applied and been admitted in the past

Research careers – Research hundreds of careers and career clusters, and take career assessments

Create plans for the future – Create goals and to-dos, and complete tasks assigned to you by the school to better prepare yourself for your future college and career goals

Naviance Student also lets us share information with you about upcoming meetings and events, local scholarship opportunities, and other resources for college and career information. You can also use the site to stay in communication with the counseling office.

Students are encouraged to review their Naviance account and complete all assigned tasks. Please log into your account via your Clever account. These tasks are designed to assist you better understand yourself and how you learn, aid you in the career exploration process, and provide you with detailed information in your college search.

Civic-Mindedness

Any students who are 18, or nearing their 18th birthday, are reminded and recommended to register to vote. Voter registration cards are available in the Counseling Office. Voters must be registered in Cuyahoga County in order to vote in any election. In order to vote in Cuyahoga County, you must meet the following requirements:

You must be a United States Citizen;

You must be at least 18 years old on the day of the General Election;
You must be a resident of Ohio for at least 30 days;
You must register to vote at least 30 days before an election to be eligible to vote.
17 year old residents can register and vote in a Primary Election if they will be 18 on or before the General Election. 17-year-olds can vote for candidates only.
