TICK TOCK, TICK TOCK: TRICK OR TREAT TIMES EXPLAINED

Do you ever wonder why the trick-or-treat times are the way they are? Well, I asked the police department and Lt. George Lichman had some answers.

What are the trick-or-treat times for Rocky River?

Trick-or-treat in Rocky River is always on Halloween, October 31, from 6:00 PM to 8:00 PM.

Why do they even set times for trick-or-treating?

Setting a time for trick-or-treating can help make the activity safer and ensure greater participation. Residents will be aware that the activity is taking place and can be available for it. It would be disorganized and chaotic for the event to be unplanned or unscheduled, leading to myriad problems.

In addition, there are ordinances in Rocky River that restrict canvassing, soliciting, and peddling, which could include trick-or-treat. A designated date and time helps the event better comply with the spirit of our canvassing laws.

How is a specific time frame chosen?

The times for trick-or-treat in Rocky River have not changed in the twenty years I've worked for the Police Department. I don't know the original reasoning for choosing 6:00 PM to 8:00 PM, but expect that it was late enough that families were home from work or school and ends early enough that those families can be home and ready for bed at a reasonable time.

Do you have any tips for kids going trick-or-treating?

- Be sure to only be out trick-or-treating between 6:00 PM and 8:00 PM on Tuesday, October 31, 2017.
- Only go to houses that have porch lights on and are obviously participating in the event.
- Younger children that go trick-or-treating should be with an adult. Older children that have permission from parents to trick-or-treat should stay in the area/neighborhood they have agreed upon with parents.
- Wear reflective clothing and/or carry flashlights, glow sticks, etc., so motorists and others can see you clearly. If wearing a mask, remove it when crossing streets so it doesn't obstruct your vision.
- Stay on sidewalks and cross the street at crosswalks or intersections.
- Be polite and courteous to other trick-or-treaters, especially younger children.
- Report suspicious behavior to your parents and, if appropriate, to police, as soon as possible.
- Don't eat all your candy in one night; ration it so you can enjoy it for many weeks instead of two or three days. This will also help to prevent stomach aches from eating too much candy at one time.
- Brush your teeth after eating candy and before bed!
- Share your candy with your parents, and not just the stuff you don't like!

BUS BREAKDOWN: WHAT HAPPENED ON 9/28/17 TO BUS 6

I E-MAILED THE HEAD OF TRANSPORTATION, ERIN PEACOCK, AND SHE ANSWERED MY QUESTION VERY NICELY (THANKS MS. PEACOCK).

SHE SPOKE WITH ERIC RATH, THE HEAD MECHANIC, WHO SAID THAT THE STARTER WAS BROKEN. " THIS CAUSED THE BUS TO NOT BE ABLE TO RESTART ONCE ALL THE STUDENTS WERE LOADED AND READY FOR THEIR TRIP HOME. UNFORTUNATELY, INCIDENTS LIKE THIS CAUSE A CHAIN REACTION OF EVENTS AND DELAYS WITH OTHER ROUTES. DUE TO THE BUS BEING INOPERABLE IN THE BUS LOOP, SOME OF THE BUSES HAD TO BE BACKED UP IN ORDER TO EXIT THE LOOP, WHILE OTHERS HAD TO WAIT FOR THE MECHANIC TO ARRIVE TO GET THE BUS MOVED AND OUT OF THE LOOP. THE MECHANIC WAS ABLE TO TEMPORARILY FIX THE BUS ON LOCATION, WHICH ENABLED HIM TO MOVE THE BUS OUT OF THE BUS LOOP. STUDENTS FROM BUS 6 WERE THEN TRANSFERRED ONTO ANOTHER BUS AND ABLE TO CONTINUE WITH THEIR ROUTE."

EIGHT OF THE BUSES ENDED UP BEING 10-15 MINUTES LATE. THE PRINCIPAL CALLED PARENTS OF BUS RIDERS TO TELL THEM THAT THE BUS WAS GOING TO BE LATE. BUS 6 WAS BROUGHT INTO THE GARAGE, WHERE THE MECHANICS FIXED IT UP. THE BUS WAS BACK ON THE ROAD THE NEXT AFTERNOON.

Interview with Rick Jackson

Question #1: How long have you been working with Ideastream?

I have been with Ideastream since 2003, after working at television stations in Cleveland (WOIO and WKYC), Philadelphia (1999), New York City (CBS News from 1995-1998), Charlotte (1986-1995), Memphis (1982-83), and my first station in Wheeling, West Virginia. I've also been on the radio at stations in Cleveland and Charlotte.



Question #2: Were you always the host of NewsDepth?

NewsDepth is in its 48th season on WVIZ/PBS. I am hosting for the 13th year. For most of those, I have been the sole host, but in previous years I sometimes shared the responsibilities with hosts Elaine Falk, Dan Moulthrop, Ida Lieszkovszky, and Michelle Kanu.

Question #3: What is the best part of your job?

Meeting kids who watch NewsDepth in the most unexpected places; like an interstate rest stop outside Dayton – or the Fulton County Fair in Wauseon, Oh – or a rock concert in Youngstown – or in different churches around Northeast Ohio – or in restaurants from Cleveland to Mansfield to Cincinnati, on the streets of Greater Cleveland, and always, always lots of students at Progressive Field when I go to see Indians games. And I go to lots of Indians games.

I also like the interviews that I do for another WVIZ show that I host, Ideas. As guests, we have had U.S. Congress members, astronauts, actors, mayors and governors, broadcasters, scientists, athletes, developers, singers, and literally thousands of people with interesting stories to share and things to tell us about.



Question #4: What is the biggest challenge in making the show?

Keeping it interesting is always fun, but making the news as fresh as possible can be challenging, since there are sometimes big events between the day we put the show together – and the different days that classes around the state watch it.... It's also hard

when terrible things happen and we want to tell the stories without saying awful things like how many people might have died.

Question #5: What subject in Newsdepth do you like the most?

I really like 'Know Ohio' which started out as introducing various counties to the rest of the state – and has really grown. And I truly appreciate the letters get to read every week, because writers are so creative, and sometimes look at the questions in ways that we didn't always anticipate.



Question #6: How often do you receive letters from kids?

We actually get hundreds of letters every week – some addressed to the show and some addressed to me. The last few years there have been more than 10,000 letters and emails during the season!

Question #7: Who really owns NewsCat?

Ideastream Producer Mary Fecteau, who sometimes is on the show with the 'Know Ohio' segment. Newscat is her pet, and has been for ten years.... And Mary is the photographer who works with NewsCat, when she is wearing costumes and typing and researching.... The cat, that is – not Mary!

Question #8: Will there be any major changes to the program in the future?

That's a closely guarded secret! They don't even tell me! Actually, we're always making little changes – even from month to month. The biggest change in 30 years was last year when we started to shoot the show without a 'set' and doing everything on a green screen – so the background behind me, or Margaret, or Mary – isn't really there! We add it electronically later.
