Healthcare updates

Dr. Lynne Eversman shared:

- Increased positive case rates with children.
- 18-24 year olds are seeing an increase in surge of positive rates.
- 80% of deaths are those over 65 years of age.
- UK variant 76% of those released from hospital have lingering issues from COVID19.
- COVID lung issues are much worse than heavy smokers.
- Health care workers are seeing 5 months of protection after infection.
- New mutations in UK and South Africa are more contagious.
- Pulse oximeter show decrease in oxygenation before symptoms appear.
- Treatments:
 - o Monoclonal treatments are very effective for high risk patients.
 - o Regenerome is very effective for high risk patients at advanced age.
- Up to 30% of people with COVID are asymptomatic.
- Tests:
 - PCR and nasal swab are very good indicators.
 - Saliva test is not as effective.
 - Governor DeWine is ordering at home testing.
- Vaccines (Pfizer and Moderna):
 - Patients rarely have significant side effects.
 - Those who have had severe anaphylaxis should wait to receive vaccine.
 - 1-2 weeks after receiving 1st shot, patients receive partial immunity.
 - Those who contracted COVID after the first shot and were treated with Regenerome should hold off on the 2nd shot.
 - May have fevers/chills and side effects 12-24 hours after vaccine.
- We will only achieve herd immunity after 70-80% of population has been vaccinated.

RRCS Updates

Dr. Shoaf shared:

- The Rr 20/20 Vision committee will no longer meet unless the need arises.
- Implementing green model Tuesday, January 26, 2021.
- Information has been submitted to the State in order for RRCSD to receive the vaccine; 90% of staff indicated willingness to get the vaccine.
- CDC Key Mitigation Strategies
 - Consistent/correct use of masks
 - Social distancing to the largest extent possible
 - Hand hygiene & respirator etiquette
 - Cleaning & disinfection
 - o Contact tracing in collaboration with CCBH
