RRMS 8th Graders Honor Local Veterans

For the fifth year in a row, eighth graders at Rocky River Middle School observed Veterans Day by celebrating local Veterans. This event, known as the Ring of Honor, is an opportunity for students to see their neighbors in a new light. "It's important that these people are all local," explains Ben Purdy, the eighth grade American history teacher who created the celebration. "It's your buddy John's grandpa or your friend Maggie's dad. That makes it more personal. These guys are actually around town and walking down the sidewalks every day."

At the start of the school year, Mr. Purdy put out a call to the eighth grade class. Anyone with a relative who is a Veteran or active-duty service member was encouraged to invite him or her to the tribute. This year, there were twenty relatives present. Mr. Purdy noted that there were representatives of all the wars that have surviving Veterans, and of every one of the branches of service, including the Coast Guard.

"When those vets walked out from behind the curtain the students were immediately captivated," Mr. Purdy relayed. "There were about three seconds of silence, then they jumped to their feet and applauded."

The eighth grade choir, led by Mrs. Fancher, sang an Armed Forces medley. As each Veteran's branch was mentioned in song, that Veteran stood, providing a moving sight for the students. After, each participant was presented with an appreciation award and escorted on a tour of the building by his Guardian. The tour included stops at the school's Remembrance Board and 9/11 Memorial.

Each year, the Ring of Honor offers a chance for two important lessons to take place: the first is for the students, who learn that the people who have sacrificed so much for them are right here among them. The second important lesson is for the Veterans, who learn, first-hand, just how valued their service is by so many.

School Nutrition



Parents, you think it's a challenge deciding what to pack in your kids' lunches every day? Try deciding the lunches of every kid in the entire district. That's the challenge facing Tina Wasserbauer (shown at left), Nutrition Specialist for the Rocky River City School District. Ms. Wasserbauer is more than prepared to meet that challenge, having been in the field for more than a decade, with a BS in nutrition and dietetics from the University of Akron, a Master's in nutrition and public health from Case, and a registered dietician's license from the State of Ohio.

"When I started out in this field," she remembers, "it was at a time when schools had contracts with Pepsi and Coke to sponsor their scoreboards and things. We'd have pop trucks pulling up to schools and candy machines for the kids." But all that has changed. "It's an interesting time to be in school lunches," she notes, "largely due to Michelle Obama's initiatives to get kids eating healthier in order to combat obesity."

To that end, Ms. Wasserbauer's predecessor made great strides in bringing the

Middle and High School lunch offerings in line with federal guidelines (Goldwood and Kensington do not offer hot lunch, with the exception of twice-monthly PTA-sponsored pizza days). "My goal this year is to bring back some of those snack items that are allowed to be sold, that can help keep our food services self-sustainable." She worked with two snack-food providers to find a la carte options, like baked chips and pretzels, that comply with nutritional guidelines.


A big step toward that goal opened up recently at the high school. The Snack Shack, located in the cafeteria, offers cappuccino and hot chocolate with high calcium content, as well as a slush machine. (How does a slush machine fit in with a healthy diet? The base of the drink is frozen apple juice.) There are also breakfast sandwiches and burritos, as well as muffins. The Shack will be open each school day from 7AM-1PM. Ms. Wasserbauer notes that there is no financial outlay for the equipment, which is also repaired and maintained by the products' respective companies.

It can be hard for parents to let their kids loose in a cafeteria, making food choices that Mom and Dad can only hope are the healthiest ones (especially when the kids are young). Tina Wasserbauer, the district Nutrition Specialist and a mother of three young boys herself, understands that concern and is taking steps to ensure that all the young diners' options are not only healthy, but appealing as well.

Rocky River City School District has earned the highest ranking from the Ohio Department of Education, according to preliminary results released last fall. For the 12th year in a row, Rocky River will be rated Excellent with Distinction, having met all state indicators for testing, attendance and graduation. The district's Performance Index of 110.8 also lands the school district within the top five school districts in the state and second in northeast Ohio.
