Required Summer Reading

- 1. How to Read Literature Like a Professor by Dr. Thomas C. Foster (ISBN 978-0062301673)
 - a. This book, used in many entry level college literature courses and many AP Lit courses around the country, is clear, concise, and extremely witty. We will reference this work throughout *the entire year*, so a clear, working knowledge of the concepts in this book will be *crucial* to your success both in this course and on the AP test.
 - b. While reading, you may take handwritten notes (on paper, on sticky note, whatever format works for you, but they may not be typed) that can be used during an assessment of your novel when you return to school. While these notes are not required, they will be helpful when being assessed on your content knowledge of the novel.

AP Literature Summer Reading Assignment

Book #1: How to Read Literature Like a Professor

- 1. You will be given 2-4 short stories upon your return to school.
- 2. After having time to read the stories outside of class, you will complete an objective multiple choice and/or short answer assessment and an in class essay that connects both self-selected and teacher-designated chapters from *How to Read Literature Like a Professor* to the content, style, themes, and motifs of your given stories.
- 3. Your in-class essay will be typed in MLA format and graded based on content, style, grammatical correctness, and your ability to connect concepts garnered from *How to Read Literature Like a Professor* to your given stories.
- 4. You also should be prepared to make connections between *How to Read Literature Like a Professor* and other works we read throughout the year, either in written or spoken (group presentation/Socratic Seminar) format.

Your text must be read by the first day of school, Wednesday, August 21, 2024.
